HSC Guiding Principles

- ❑ Clarify values and assumptions
- ❑ Drive decision-making process
- ❑ Enhance (internal and external) communication
- ❑ Create clear pathway forward
- ❑ Mobilize people and their power



HSC All-In Framework

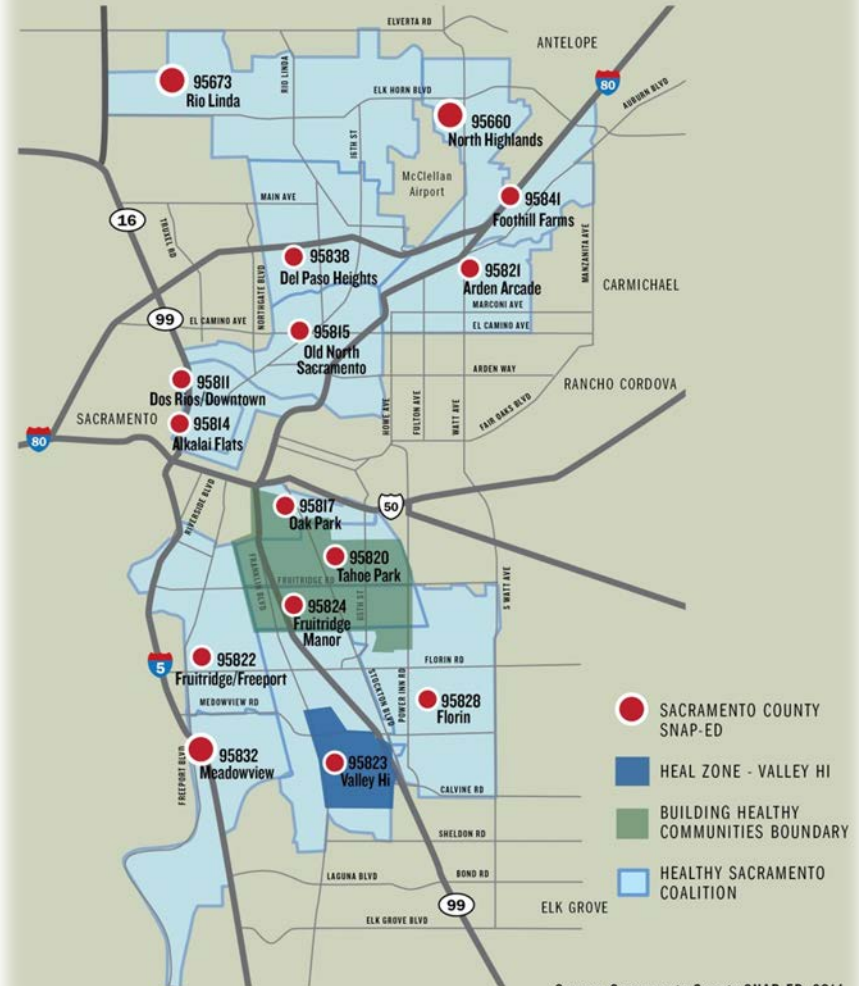
Scope of Work:

- Develop guiding principles for HSC operations
 - Gather baseline data
 - Develop community narrative
 - Develop racial impact assessment tool
 - Pluck the low-hanging fruit
 - Build capacity and movement
 - Leverage and build resources (funding/sustainability)
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Gather Baseline Data

- ❑ Racial inequities of social determinants of health
- ❑ 15 zip codes (and region)
- ❑ Strengthen existing data
- ❑ Community engagement with focus on populations most impacted by racial inequities
- ❑ Community data analysis
- ❑ Understand what poverty looks like

COMMUNITY HEALTH EFFORTS IN SACRAMENTO COUNTY



Community Narrative

- ❑ Using data to articulate a community narrative
- ❑ Target narrative for diverse and specific audiences
- ❑ Narrative to help establish common ground, inspire movement building
- ❑ Stories about community pride, assets, and organizing
- ❑ Grounded in the community reality



Create Racial Impact Assessment Tool

- ❑ Tailor tool for Sacramento region to adopt
- ❑ Use consistently to uncover inequities in policies and resource allocation practices
- ❑ Train youth, community members
- ❑ Learn from other communities



Picking the Low Hanging Fruit

- ❑ Prioritize 1 – 2 policy discussion/issues ripe for the picking (e.g., LCAP, school discipline, Proposition 47 implementation, allocation of adult use of marijuana tax revenue)
- ❑ Engage policy makers (test the waters)



Build Capacity and Movement



- ❑ Learn from other All-In Cities and racial equity movements
 - ❑ Provide training on tools to promote racial justice including implicit bias, racism, power and privilege
 - ❑ Focus on power building with communities of color
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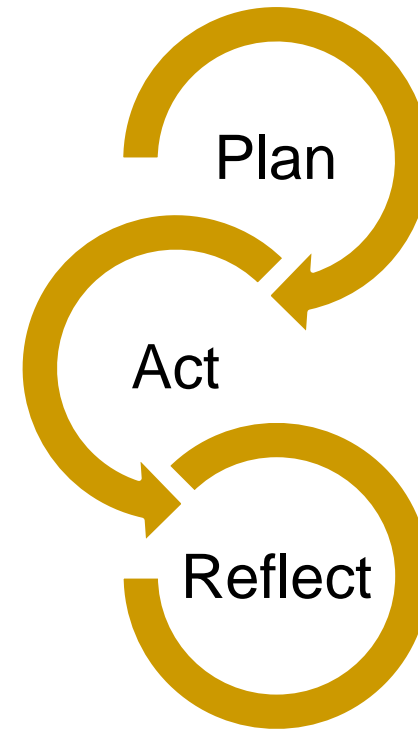
Build Resources and Funding

- ❑ HSC is resource rich! Tap into the richness of the existing resources within the coalition.
 - ❑ Coalition members have resources to convene and mobilize
 - ❑ Use baseline data and community narrative to build additional resources and funding
 - ❑ All about relationships and how to connect them for common good
 - ❑ Funding for coalition infrastructure
