Aspirinet

Urban and Rural: San Joaquin and Stanislaus

\$15,000 – Health Information Technology

To improve the quality of life of foster youth in San Joaquin and Stanislaus counties by developing a sustainable system for creating and maintaining electronic foster youth “life records.”

Calaveras Community Foundation

Rural: Calaveras

\$15,000 – Oral Health

To improve the oral health of homebound senior citizens by providing preventive and restorative direct mobile dental services.

Children’s Network of Solano County

Urban and Rural: Solano

\$15,000 – Nutrition

To improve the nutrition and health of low-income individuals through increased awareness of and access to CalFresh benefits.

Community Against Sexual Harm

Urban: Sacramento

\$10,000 – Access to Health Services

To enable victims of sexual exploitation to lead healthier lives through expanded outreach and harm reduction services.

The Gathering Inn

Urban: Placer

\$10,000 – Oral Health

To improve the health and employment outcomes of people who are homeless in south Placer County by providing general and restorative dental care.

Rural: Glenn

\$15,000 – Physical Activity

To improve the health of children and youth from low-income families by increasing fitness levels through multiple physical activity programs led by older youth serving as mentors.

Golden Valley Community Broadcasters

Urban and Rural: Butte

\$10,000 – Access to Health Services

To reduce health disparities among Hmong, Latino, Native American and low-income, isolated populations through monthly culturally appropriate community health education radio segments.

Immigrant Legal Resource Center

Urban and Rural: Sacramento, Butte, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Solano, Yolo and Yuba

\$15,000 – Access to Health Services

To promote access to health care services for immigrants by training health and social services providers and immigrants about eligibility for program services.

Infant Parent Center

Urban and Rural: El Dorado

\$15,000 – Mental Health

To strengthen underserved low-income families with young children by providing mental health assessment and treatment for infants, children and families, and parenting support.

Interfaith Council of Amador

Rural: Amador

\$10,000 – Food Security

To improve food security through the Emergency Food Purchase Program by stocking specific nutritional items as inventories run low and maximizing funds when discounts are available.

Lakeview Assembly

Urban: San Joaquin

\$10,680 – Food Security

To provide food, clothing, recreation activities and encouragement to low-income families by securing a reliable method of transportation and delivery.

Native Alliance of the Sierra Nevada Foothills

Urban and Rural: Placer and Nevada

\$15,000 – Domestic Violence

To improve the well-being of Native American women who have experienced domestic violence through culturally relevant prevention, counseling, advocacy and family support services.

PRIDE Industries Foundation
Urban and Rural: Placer and Sacramento
\$14,230 – Employment Skills

To improve employment outcomes for veterans with disabilities by providing job preparation and placement services, and connecting veterans to needed health care and support resources.

Safe Ground Sacramento, Inc.
Urban: Sacramento and Yolo
\$15,000 – Housing/Shelter

To reduce homelessness by completing planning and development activities required to develop an emergency housing community site, as a first step to permanent housing.

Sierra Forever Families
Rural: Nevada
\$15,000 – Access to Health Services

To provide permanency for Nevada County children in foster care by recruiting committed foster families in the county, and providing children and families with behavioral health care supports.

Slavic Assistance Center
Urban: Sacramento and Yolo
\$14,872 – Physical Activity

To improve the health of adults and seniors in the Slavic community who experience isolation and/or chronic diseases through organized walking groups in their neighborhoods.

Tuolumne Me-Wuk Indian Health Center, Inc.
Rural: Tuolumne, Amador and Calaveras
\$15,000 – Oral Health

To improve health and quality of life of low-income children and adults by providing basic oral health services through the replacement of dental equipment.

We Care Program – Turlock
Urban and Rural: Stanislaus
\$10,000 – Housing/Shelter

To assist homeless men become self-sufficient by providing shelter to meet core needs and directing eligible participants to services and housing programs.

Yolo Family Resource Center
Urban and Rural: Yolo
\$10,000 – Access to Health Services

To improve the health of low-income Latino families in Yolo County through outreach, health education, benefit enrollment and support provided by peer health workers (promotoras).
